John Gallardo: Conversation with a Hispanic Trailblazer

Coach John Gallardo served as Head Baseball Coach of Fox Tech High School.

This is a question-and-answer session with Hispanic trailblazer John Gallardo, Assistant Athletic Director in North East ISD.

Q: What makes you a Hispanic trailblazer?

A: In 2020 - 2021 I was hired as the first ever Hispanic/Minority Assistant Athletic Director in the Northeast ISD. The first AD in the district was in 1957. It only took 63 years.

Q: Coach Gallardo, can you please tell our readers about your current job assignment, educational background, and any of your professional association affiliations.

A: I oversee Cross Country and Track. I am responsible for planning meets, scheduling meets, ordering equipment and distribution of equipment to all Cross Country and Track Coaches. I received my undergraduate degree from the University of North Texas and have a master's degree from Texas A & M San Antonio. I am part of the Texas High School Coaches Association, the Hispanic Texas HS Football Coaches Association, and the Texas Athletic Director's Association.

Q: Tell us a little about your family and where your currently reside.

A: My wife, Ann, and I have been happily married for 17 years. I am the definition of a girls dad. I have two great step-daughters, Taylor, 31 who is a Physician Assistant in Austin and Katelyn, 26 who is finishing her Masters at Texas State in San Marcos. I have one daughter, Analie, 11 who we were blessed to adopt at birth.

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Coach Gallardo gives a lot of credit to his mother for the success he has enjoyed over the years.

Q: Share with our readers your favorite quote or saying.

A: "The Best Ability is Availability." Always make yourself available if you want to advance in this profession.

Q: Do you have any material that has been published over the years highlighting your work?

A: I was published once in 2008 when I coached at Clark for a narrative titled, "The Real Field of Dreams." It was about the blood, sweat and tears we poured into our little inner-city field at Fox Tech H.S. The book is a compilation of narratives written by English teachers in the Northside school district. Also, one of my college professors at A& M San Antonio used two of my research papers as examples for his classes for a year...My work being recognized was an honored since I poured my heart and soul into these papers.

Q: Can you tell us about your high school and collegiate career?

A: I attended Alamo Heights HS. For two years, I played football, basketball, and baseball. My last two years I focused on football and baseball. I started as a catcher all four years. I was first team All-District linebacker and second team fullback my senior year. I was an All-City Honorable Mention linebacker as well. I was voted team captain and Defensive player of the year by my peers. I was also an All-District Honorable Mention Catcher. I received a baseball scholarship to play at Hill Junior College and Southwest Texas State in San Marcos. I later graduated from The University of North Texas in 1990.

Q: Tell us about the schools you have worked at and your time as an educator and coach prior to becoming an administrator.

A: It's a long list, but I don't want to leave anyone out. I was at Oak Crest Middle School from 1993-1995, East Central High School from 1995-2000, Fox Tech High School from 2000-2008, Clark High School from 2008-2012, Eisenhower Middle School from 2012-2013, Wagner High School from 2013-2014, Nimitz Middle School from 2014 - 2015, and Ed White Middle School from 2015 - 2018 where I served as Athletic Coordinator. From 1993-2008, I coached mainly football and baseball, but also coached basketball and track along the way. During that time, I was teaching physical

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education and health, and also taught one year of psychology. From 2008-2015 I taught all levels of English and mainly coached football and baseball at those schools.

Q: Please share a few milestones in your career that have contributed to you being where you are now.

A: The one milestone I am most proud of is guiding Fox Tech to their first ever baseball playoff appearance. We ended up making the playoffs 4 years in a row until I left in 2008. No one believed in our downtown San Antonio inner-city school. We built a program there. Reaching my 100th win as a head baseball coach was also special.
